Louis Lotz has written some poignant articles on the subject of assuming guilt of doing wrong. It is obvious from these actual illustrations that mankind is not willing to own the responsibility for having done wrong.

“In 1980 a Boston court acquitted Michael Tindall of flying illegal drugs into the United States. Tindall’s attorneys argued that he was a victim of ‘action addict syndrome,’ an emotional disorder that makes a person crave dangerous, thrilling situations. Tindall was not a drug dealer, merely a thrill seeker.

An Oregon man who tried to kill his ex-wife was acquitted on the grounds that he suffered from depression/suicide syndrome,’ whose victims deliberately commit poorly planned crimes with the unconscious goal of being caught or killed. He didn’t really want to shoot his wife. He wanted the police to shoot him.

Then there is the famous ‘Twinkie syndrome.’ Attorneys for Dan White, who murdered San Francisco mayor George Moscone, blamed the crime on emotional stress linked to White’s junk food binges. White was acquitted of murder and convicted on a lesser charge of manslaughter.

Nowadays, nobody’s at fault for anything. We are a nation of victims.”

A number of years ago, Flip Wilson was renowned for saying, “The Devil made me do it!”

Is not there some of this mentality in each of us? Whether it is denial, ignorance, or simply self-defense, we avoid owning up to our sins, faults, and weaknesses. James gave instruction, “*Let no man say when he is tempted, I am tempted of God: for God cannot be tempted with evil, neither tempteth he any man: But every man is tempted, when he is drawn away of his own lust, and enticed. Then when lust hath conceived, it bringeth forth sin: and sin, when it is finished, bringeth forth death*” (Jas. 1:13-15). Paul insisted, in his letter to the Galatians, that there is a battle occurring between the flesh and the Spirit. The outcome is determined by which assumes the leadership role (I Cor. 6:17). One can know by consulting the scripture, the source of guilt. Guilt for such must bring sorrow in heart toward God (2 Cor. 7:10). One must assume it and repent of it (Lk. 13:3), having it washed away by the blood of Christ in order to be saved from it (I Pet. 1:18-19).
