Guilty About Guilt

Guilt is without question one of the most common problems that causes Christians to struggle. Whether we feel guilty because of our weaknesses or it is caused by not feeling as if we are meeting up to someone else's expectation, the problem is still real and burdensome.

Coping with self and guilt requires that we understand who God is. If we have an inadequate view of God, we can never understand sin or forgiveness. Understanding God, who He is, and how He wants us to relate to Him, can help us greatly.

God is holy (Lev. 19:2; Lk. 1:49; Rev. 4:8-11). His holiness demands a response from us...being like Him. We cannot be like Him if we are guilty of sin, "to miss the mark." We must remember that God is just. His justice provides for us forgiveness from all sin and unrighteousness (I Jn. 1:9). David knew that his acknowledgement of sin activated the justice of God in forgiving him (Ps. 32:5). God will deal fairly with us and is gracious with His compassion and justice (Isa. 30:18). The justice, or "fair treatment" demands that our sins be dealt with in a fair, complete, and merciful manner (Rom. 5:6-8). This "process" proves that God is love! This love was manifested in the dying of His son Jesus for sinful man (I Jn. 4:16-19). Perfect love drives out fear which releases guilt! He deals with us, not on the badness of our wrongs, but on the goodness of His love for us (Ps. 103:10-12; Jn. 3:16). Because of this love, God does not desire to see us endure guilt or punishment (Ezek. 18:30-32). God has chosen to buy us back again (I Jn. 3:3, 19). God is merciful (Deut. 4:31). "His mercy extends to those who fear (respect) Him" (Lk. 1:50). His ability to save is conditional upon man's ability to obey (Heb. 5:9). Best of all, guilt ridden friends, God is forgiving! God did not desert His troubled people of old (Neh. 9:17b), nor will He leave us today (Matt. 28:20), even though we too sometimes rebel against Him (Dan. 9:9). If we love much, responding in obedience, our sins can be forgiven, and guilt blotted out (Lk. 7:47-50; I Jn. 1:7).

What One Tolerates, the Next Accepts

John Wesley once wrote, "What one generation tolerates, the next generation will embrace." Both sacred and secular history have proven the truth of this assessment time and time again.

Everything from dancing to drinking, from abortion to mercy-killing, has gone from toleration to acceptance. In the home and in the church, everything from immodesty to immorality has been first allowed and then endorsed. Adulterous marriages, gambling, and other similar sins, have gone from being permitted to being sponsored. Remember when wearing shorts and attending dances were generally condemned as sinful? Now, in some places shorts are being worn to church services and dances are sometimes held in church buildings! Truly, "what one generation tolerates, the next generation will embrace."

One generation tolerated sprinkling for baptism if a person were seriously ill. The next generation accepted sprinkling for baptism as an option for everyone. One generation approved a "head" elder. The next generation appointed some elders "bishops." One generation introduced instruments of music as an aid to poor singing. The next generation demanded we worship with instruments. One generation accepted the "fellowship hall" (which, at first, was just a few tables in the basement for social meals). The next generation built gymnasiums and "Family Life Centers." One generation apologized for "hard preachers" who opposed denominationalism. The next generation saw their sons and daughters joining those denominations. One generation spoke of the need to reach out in a "nonjudgmental" way to our Catholic and Protestant friends. The next generation welcomed Presbyterians into "our fellowship" with only a handshake. One generation spoke of congregational singing as "one of our traditions." The next generation defended choruses and choirs. One generation applauded preachers who closed their sermons without an appeal for sinners to be baptized for the remission of sins. The next generation denied the gospel plan of salvation in general and baptism in particular.

What does this say to us? What is our responsibility? "You shall observe to do therefore as the Lord... hath commanded you: ye shall not turn aside to the right hand or to the left" (Deut. 5:32). "Hold fast the form of sound words" (2 Tim. 1:13). "Continue thou in the things which thou hast learned and hast been assured of, knowing of whom thou hast learned them" (2 Tim. 3:14). "Mark them which cause divisions and offenses contrary to the doctrine which ye have learned; and avoid them" (Rom. 16:17). The next time we are tempted to deviate from the word of God, let us remember that what we tolerate, our children will embrace.

The Average

If a man were to stand with one foot on a hot stove and one foot in a freezer, some statistician would assert that, on average, he's comfortable.

This reminds me of some who seem to feel that they can come to church on Sunday and yet live like the devil during the week. They say that they are, on the average, pretty good people.

Such a person cannot be "comfortable" any more than the man with his foot on the stove and the other in a freezer. He is "a doubleminded man, unstable in all his ways" (James 1:8). He has only enough religion to be miserable, but not enough to go to heaven.

Our Lord does not prefer an average. He wants his people to be either "cold or hot." The average nauseates Him. He will spew out of his mouth those who are lukewarm (Rev. 3:15-1 6). Brother, you had better get all the way on the Lord's side now, lest you spend eternity with the devil.
