Bearing One Another's Burdens in the Family of God

The subject of burden-bearing had its beginning with Paul's admonitions to the Galatian Christians (Gal. 6:2). This passage, in addition to many others, give emphasis to the fact that Christianity is a life of service. Numerous deeds can be performed to lighten the load of so many. When contemplating this subject, one must naturally give thought to the following.

Burdens can be borne by **our very presence**. Great comfort can be extended during loss of life, sickness, loneliness, etc., by being there. Mary and Martha were comforted by the presence of Jesus at the death of their brother, Lazarus. Job was comforted by three friends when he was hurting. Words can be soon forgotten, but your presence will last for life.

Help can be rendered by the **speaking of kind words** which console, comfort, give hope, and often just give instruction (Gen. 50:21). Job was comforted "over all evil" by the words spoken by his brothers and sisters (Job 42:11).

Sometimes, **our silence** can be helpful! Too often we feel that something needs to be said. Sympathy, concern, love and genuine compassion can often be cheapened by words. A warm handshake, embrace, being near, faint smile or contribution of a genuine tear speaks volumes from the heart.

The Christian, when in a proper relationship with God, will have greater advantage than those who are not in "communication with God." **Prayer** is one of the Christians greatest avenues of service. Paul acknowledged the help received from the Corinthians through prayer (2 Cor. 1:10-11). God was to receive the credit, yet the Corinthian Christians unleashed God's power through their prayers. Furthermore, Paul believed that he could be delivered from threats of unbelievers by prayers of the Romans (Rom. 15:30-31). "The effective, fervent prayer of a righteous man avails much" (Jas. 5:16).

Around each of us today are those in poverty, loneliness, troubled about crime and world conditions, physically in pain, etc. We should open our hearts, purse and soul for their betterment. God truly cares...so should we!

That's More Than I Am Supposed to Do

Practically all progress in the world has been made by those who did more than their share, "more than they were supposed to do."

Our independence was won by George Washington and his men who "did more than they were supposed to do" as they suffered privation at Valley Forge while others were living in luxury not far away. Many a lad has been set up in business or given a college education by parents who "did more than they were supposed to do" while neighbor boys are left without a start in life by satisfied parents. Many a sick child has been brought back to health by a sacrificing mother who did more than her share.

The church of the Lord has been established in many places in America by sacrificing Christians who did far more than their share - they could have worshipped down the street - but they did more than they were supposed to do (according to the opinion of men) and established the Lord's church.

Most of the work around the church building is done by Christians who "do more than they are supposed to do" while many are perfectly willing that they should do it. (This reminds me of something I heard one time. A preacher was asked it there was anyone at the church where he preached that were willing to work. He said, "Everyone in this church is willing, five percent are willing to work, and the other 95 percent are willing to let them do it." - t.t.). If it were not for those who do more than they are supposed to do by giving themselves, this congregation wouldn't grow, but would stagnate and die.

After all, "doing more that we are supposed to do" as men judge is the very crux of Christianity. It means 'going more than half way,' 'turning the other cheek,' 'loving one's enemies,' 'praying for those who persecute us,' 'giving money to the needy,' 'working for the Lord while others are engaged in pleasure.' Yes, it means all this and more. But this will bring eternal life for the faithful, all of whom "did more than they were supposed to do."
