## When Paul Was Quarantined: The Beauty of Christ's Church

Paul spent two years quarantined. Can you imagine? Paul spent two years quarantined as a Roman prisoner. Can you imagine that? That's a bit different than being quarantined in the comfort of your own home for a few weeks. Well, what did the apostle Paul do with himself for two years? Scripture tells us what he spent much of his time doing: "he explained and solemnly testified of the kingdom of God" (Acts 28:23). Paul focused on the church. He even wrote a letter to his Christian friends in Ephesus extoling and glorifying the beauty of Christ's church.

While in quarantine, Paul focused on the abundant blessings possessed by those in Christ's church. Paul wanted his friends to be reminded that "God...has blessed us with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places in Christ" (Eph. 1:3). He went on in this chapter to enumerate and emphasize a number of these blessings provided only to those in Christ's church. "He chose us in Him before the foundation of the world...He made us accepted in the Beloved...In Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins...In Him also we have obtained an inheritance...in whom also, having believed, you were sealed with the Holy Spirit of promise" (Eph. 1:4, 6, 7, 11, 13, 14). Although isolated, there are numerous spiritual blessings available only to those in the Lord's church, which is the reason the first chapter ends by describing the church as "the fullness of Him who fills all in all" (Eph. 1:23). Do you focus on these exclusive blessings?

While in quarantine, Paul focused on the incredible unity enjoyed by those in Christ's church. The church is made up of people who were all, at one time, "dead in trespasses and sins" (Eph. 2:1), but had been "saved" by the "grace" of God (Eph. 2:4-9).

The church is made up of people who were not only estranged from Christ (Eph 2:12), but were also estranged from each other and needed to be "brought near by the blood of Christ" (Eph. 2:13) and reconciled "to God in one body through the cross" (Eph. Eph. 2:16). Once in the church, these peoples from such varied backgrounds and even sharp enmity, all now "have access by one Spirit to the Father," all are "fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God," and all are "built together for a dwelling place of God" (Eph. 2:18-22). Although isolated, there should still exist a genuine unity and cross-shaped bond that ties us together no matter what. Do you focus on the unity of God's people? Acts 2:41-47 41 "So then, those who had received his word were baptized; and that day there were added about three thousand souls. 42 They were continually devoting themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. 43Everyone kept feeling a sense of awe; and many wonders and signs were taking place through the apostles. 44 And all those who had believed were together and had all things in common; 45 and they began selling their property and possessions and were sharing them with all, as anyone might have need. 46 Day by day continuing with one mind in the temple, and breaking bread from house to house, they were taking their meals together with gladness and sincerity of heart, 47 praising God and having favor with all the people. And the Lord was adding to their number day by day those who were being saved."

Although Paul was separated from his dear friends in the church, he counted his blessings to be a part of God's family. In the rest of the letter, he focused on the amazing transformation experienced by those in Christ's church. What a glorious blessing to a part of the beautiful church of Christ. Let's not take it for granted! Let us glorify Him in it (Eph. 3:21).

## He's not Heavy, He's my Brother

The story is told of two brothers around three years apart. The older one was a popular 15-year-old and had an abundance of friends. His younger brother, 12 at the time, was less popular and a little awkward around people. The younger of the two boys had developed slower than most boys his age due to a medical issue. The doctors who had been treating the boy were not sure what was going on, but the young boy would have sporadic seizures. The older brother loved his younger brother and included him in everything he could.

One day the older brother was going on a hike with some of his friends and as was his habit, the older brother invited his younger brother to go. Even though his friends tried to talk him out of taking his younger brother he did not give in and the younger brother went. The hike was going well, and they hiked all day. On the way back, the older brother began noticing his younger brother's breathing get heavier and he was falling behind. His friends yelled back, "keep up, come on." The Older brother signaled to his friends to keep going and assured them that they would catch up. The younger brother's breathing progressively became more labored and now he could barely walk. The boys sat down to take a break and as the younger brother sat down he began to have a seizure.

The older brother became extremely worried and helped control his younger brother, after the seizure stopped the younger brother was not responsive. The older brother picked up his younger brother and began running down the mountain knowing he had to get him help and fast. As he caught up to the other boys they noticed that something was wrong, they could see the younger brother lying limp in the older brother's arms who now had tears streaming down his face. The other boys asked to help, to maybe take turns carrying the younger brother, the older brother just kept running. As the older brother passed them he yelled back, "he is not heavy, he is my brother!"

As Christians we have a responsibility to bear one another's burdens. When we are struggling we need to be able to go to our church family for help. We also need to be able to help those who are struggling. Paul tells the churches in Galatia, "Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2). When a brother or sister is struggling we need to be willing to pick them up and carry them, helping them along the way.

## **Cleaning Out the Barn**

Growing up, this was the job I hated the most (and, hated is not too strong a word). Three times a week I had to clean out the feed room in the barn. That includes everything you think would be included. It was a stinky, unpleasant job. I did it because it was my chore to do. I did it because dad made me.

Fast forward 30 years. Saturday afternoon I was feeding the cows for Pop. I finished his instructions and was about to leave the feed room when I noticed how dirty the floor was. I looked over and saw the shovel to the side and decided to clean the floor for him. I did the same thing that I'd done 30 years ago. It was just as unpleasant. But this time I did it not because I had to, but because I love him.

Obedience to God is kind of like that. Early on in our spiritual life, we obey because we have to; we do what we're told. Somewhere along the way, though — if you're really growing — we start obeying because we love him. Tasks that seemed to be so difficult at one point become much more bearable. That's why — long term — love is a far better motivator in Christian service than fear or obligation.

"If you love me, you will keep My commandments" (John 14:15)
