We owe our blessings to God who is the giver of "every good and perfect gift" (Jas. 1:17). We must keep in mind that, "Unless the Lord builds the house, They labor in vain who build it..." (Ps. 127:1).

Acknowledging the Lord as our God is an important first-step toward providing our children with the same blessing we enjoyed in being raised up under freedom's banner. Scripture reminds us: "How blessed are the people whose God is the Lord!" (Ps. 144:15). Profession, however, without performance, is never enough. There must also be on our part a sincere desire to follow after the teachings of the Lord. Scripture says, "Righteousness exalts a nation, But sin is a reproach to any people" (Prov. 14:34). Righteousness, then, is the key to national success. But, what is righteousness? Simply put, righteousness is doing the right thing. We do not determine what is right and wrong. 

A little more than 150 years ago, General Robert E. Lee was camped approximately 10 miles from General Stonewall Jackson. Lee sent a message to Stonewall Jackson, informing him that he wanted to meet with him at his convenience.

The very next morning, while Lee was eating his breakfast, Jackson appeared at his tent, prepared for their meeting. Lee asked Jackson, "What are you doing here? I didn't mean for you to come immediately. It wasn't urgent. Did you not read what I said? I said, 'at your convenience.' You unnecessarily rode through a terrible snowstorm to get here." In defense of his ac-

tions, Stonewall Jackson responded, "General Lee, your slightest desire is my greatest command."
