Thru Hikers

Every year, about 1500 "thru-hikers" set out to walk the entire Appalachian Trail in a single season. Only 10 percent complete the 2.160 miles of challenging terrain stretching from Georgia to Main. One reason some people drop out early is that they haven't learned to travel light.

A friend of mine launched his thru-hike carrying a seriously overloaded backpack. He had a cassette player and six tapes of bird calls, an air pistol to keep the varmints away, a camera, a radio, and alarm clock. "If it ran on batteries," he said, I had one in my pack."

At his first stop, and experienced hiker helped him go through his pack and decide what to keep and what to send home. Each item was placed on a gram scale with the question, "is it worth it?" Do you want to carry this for the next 2000 miles?"

My friend discovered that his biggest problem was an accumulation of little things. Most of his extra weight was in ounces, not pounds. He didn't need half of what was in his first-aid kit nor the extra tube of toothpaste. His heavy multi-tool knife was replaced with one weighing only an ounce. A mental knife-fork-and-spoon set gave way to a single plastic spoon. He sent home 26 pounds of unnecessary weight.

How many of us are trying to walk the trail of faith in Christ weighed down by an accumulation of little things— anger, bitterness, worry, envy, jealousy, lust, and selfishness? Instead of enjoying the beauty of life with Jesus, we complain about how hard it is to follow Him.

Psalm 32 is for everyone who's ready to shed the weigh of sin and regain the joy of walking with the Lord. *"Blessed is he whose transgression are forgiven, whose sins are covered"* (32:1).

David's Prayer in the Cave

It was in one of the lowest points in his life that David finds himself hiding in a cave praying to God. He says, "With my voice I cry out to the Lord; with my voice I plead for mercy to the Lord" (Psa. 142:1).

David describes the circumstances that have caused him to feel discouraged. He says in verse 4, "Look to the right and see: there is none who takes notice of me; no refuge remains to me; no one cares for my soul."

How often do we find ourselves feeling this same way? It could be the people we work with that don't see the value of our Christianity. It could be friends at school pushing us to break our Christian values. It could even be our own families that don't care for our souls.

David felt the loneliness of desertion with his own son, he felt betrayal from Saul, and he even willfully separated himself from God when he went after Bathsheba.

Many times we find ourselves in the cave. It could be that outside circumstances have put us there, or we sinned and are feeling the consequences of those choices.

Put yourself in his shoes, hiding in a dark, desolate and damp cave feeling alone and deserted by everyone. Everyone except God. David never lost sight of God, and he knew that God would answer his prayer.

When we find ourselves in the dark, feeling deserted and alone, don't lose sight of God. He will never turn His back on a struggling Christian. He cares for your soul. $\sim Carl Pollard$
