"Compromise" in Marriage?

The word "compromise" is a word that often means different things to different people. It is used often in marriage counseling, in an effort to help a husband and a wife to learn to get along and to find some kind of common ground in their relationship and even in their arguments. "Just compromise." However, while some may see the word as an innocent, soft term, designed to deescalate a situation and bring about a calm, someone else may see the word as an attack on their rights to happiness in a relationship, especially if they are "always the one who has to compromise." Maybe that is why God didn't use the word "compromise" in the Bible.

The word that God did use in the New Testament to address the marriage relationship and to describe how to settle disputes is the word "love" (or the Greek noun, *agape*). The word describes one who looks out for and seeks to meet the needs of another in an unselfish and unconditional manner. <u>Philippians 2:3-4</u> is a wonderful depiction of this concept.

In marriage, rather than focus on "compromise," focus on looking out for each other's needs (and even desires). When a husband and a wife are both seeking to meet the needs (and even desires) of their spouse (and not forcing their own needs and desires and demanding "compromise"), this is where true peace, harmony and happiness can be achieved in the marriage.

Of course, a spouse should never yield when it comes to matters of faith and doctrine. The church must come first, worship must be a weekly priority, Biblical morality must be defended, sin must never be condoned, and sound doctrine must never be compromised. Those are non-negotiables! And, of course, a couple should never incur financial hardships just to have what one of them (or both of them) might desire.

But, when it comes to matters that are truly inconsequential (Biblically or financially), husbands and wives both should look for ways to put their spouse's needs (and even desires) above their own. Whether it's furniture, decorations, games, crafts, hobbies, pets, TV shows, etc., could it be that Jesus' words are true even here—"It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35)? This goes for both husbands and wives! Both should seek for ways to elevate the other. Both should seek for ways to "give," without looking "to receive" anything. That's the nature of a Jesus-centered marriage!

Rather than use the word "compromise" (which is not always equally defined), what if our marriages were filled with true agape love, seeking to meet each other's needs?

Adversity Makes us Bitter or Better

David makes some truly amazing statements in Psalms which allows us to look into his heart and learn why he was so special to God. David had immeasurable adversity when even his own son led a rebellion against him.

So, how did he view such trials? Read his words, and they may change how we look at life. David said, "It is good that I was afflicted." Our first reaction is that such could not be right! How on earth could any suffering be seen as good? Read the rest of the verse. David said, "It is good for me that I was afflicted, that I might learn your statutes" (Psalms 119:71). David understood a lesson which each of us should learn early in our life. If our life has little misery and adversity, we tend to ignore God for we have little need of Him. On the other hand, adversity provides us the opportunity to come closer to God. How we respond to such trials shows the kind of heart we have. It is so important to learn that adversity makes us bitter or better.

The apostle Paul understood this same truth. In his second letter to Corinth, he gave a list of many of the trials he had endured, then he said, "Therefore I take pleasure in infirmities, in reproaches, in needs, in persecutions, in distresses for Christ's sake. For when I am weak, then I am strong" (2 Cor. 12:10). Read the verse again— infirmities, reproaches, needs, persecutions, distresses. Pleasure in all of this? How strange! But what insight David and Paul had into how to deal with all that life brings.

The Power of an Invitation

Brother Glenn L. McCullough was in the dairy business near Tupelo, Mississippi. Mr. A.D. Prince was a salesman from Memphis who regularly called on him for needed supplies. One day, Mr. Prince arrived at brother McCullough's farm rather late in the afternoon. He was told he would have to come back the next day because there was a Gospel meeting at the Gloster Street church of Christ that night and he was getting ready to attend. Mr. Prince said that was fine and agreed to come back the next day. As he was leaving, brother McCullough thought, "I should ask him to attend our Gospel meeting." He invited the salesman to stay for supper and attend the Gospel meeting. Mr. Prince agreed and

not only attended that night but attended three nights of the Gospel meeting conducted by Jack Meyer. Even though he learned what to do to become a Christian, he did not obey the Gospel during his visits.

A few months later, Mr. Prince was given a new job and did not come back to Tupelo to call on brother McCullough. Many years passed by and one day brother McCullough saw a newspaper story about A.D. Prince III, who was a student at a Christian college. He made a few phone calls and found out Mr. Prince had received another invitation to attend a tent meeting in Memphis which was a few blocks from where he worked. He attended the Gospel meeting and obeyed the Gospel the first night. Later, he became an elder in the church and the student honored at the Christian college was his grandson.

Years later, both brother McCullough and brother Prince learned they had a terminal disease and were given just a few months to live. As time drew near for both men, brother Prince had his sister to drive him from his home in Arkansas to brother McCullough's home in Tupelo to pay one final visit and to say, "I want to thank you for inviting me to the Gospel meeting that night. If it had not been for your invitation, I probably would never have heard the Gospel and become a Christian. It was your invitation that made it possible for my family, my grandchildren, and me to become Christians. I will be forever grateful. Thank you.

"What would have happened to the Prince family if brother McCullough had said, "My conscience says I ought to invite this salesman to the Gospel meeting, but I know it won't do any good?"

The Bible says, "Go ye therefore into the highways, and as many as ye shall find, bid to the marriage" (Matthew 22:9). Gospel meetings are not out-of-date; neither is inviting the lost to hear the preaching of the Gospel. \sim author unknown \sim
